

File Form 0619 Construction of a new hospital building at O'Chrov Referral Hospital, Cambodia Final Report for the Eagle Foundation – January 2024

Introduction: Your grant has enabled IMPACT Cambodia to oversee the construction of a new hospital building at O'Chrov Referral Hospital in order to ease in-patient overcrowding, and to create space for the treatment of Accident and Emergency cases and a dedicated Maternity Unit, including delivery suite and postnatal ward. This busy hospital is the referral facility for seven health centres in O'Chrov, the most densely populated district in Banteay Meanchey Province. It is located some 25km from Poipet, the large international border town with

Thailand and serves 57,872 people living in the surrounding area – as well as supporting the region's transient population of tourists, traders and migrant workers. Throughout the course of the project, the design of the new building underwent two amendments, in discussion with Fondation Eagle. The new building opened to patients in June 2023.

Project beneficiaries: O'Chrov Hospital serves a population of 57,872 people. On average, there are 9,000 patients per year and 590 babies born.

Details of the project:

Although public healthcare services in government-run hospitals and health centers in Cambodia are subsidised, there are still nominal user fees and associated out-of-pocket expenses. Although O'Chrov Referral hospital is situated in between the larger towns of Poipet and Sisophon, it serves a surrounding rural population, whose economy is centered around seasonal agricultural practices, with residents engaged in activities such as farming and rearing livestock. The average local household income is just USD 1,000 per year, which makes prioritising healthcare a significant consideration for many people.

In 2019, the hospital was upgraded from 'Health Centre' to 'Referral Hospital' status. However, without additional investment, it soon became apparent that the hospital's resources and infrastructure were insufficient meet the increasing patient demand; 'O'Chrov Referral Hospital is a referral hospital in name only and its facilities do not befit its new role. There is an urgent need for better accommodation for in-patients, especially children, as many are treated outside due to the lack of space and beds' – Sambo Tey, Director, IMPACT Cambodia.

Knowing of IMPACT Cambodia's successful track-record of working in partnership with statutory agencies to improve hospital infrastructure - and provide equipment and training for healthworkers - the hospital Administration approached IMPACT with a plan to construct a new building, which would address three of the hospital's main shortfalls: Namely, overcrowding in general wards; lack of dedicated space for the treatment of Accident and Emergency cases; and cramped, unsuitable conditions for women giving birth and in recovery afterwards. We were so grateful to Fondation Eagle for agreeing to this much-needed upgrade.

Early plans were drawn up by a local architectural company for a small-scale building, which was proposed and agreed by Fondation Eagle in December 2021. However, during the early stages of planning between IMPACT Cambodia, the hospital Administration, the Provincial Health Authority and building contractors, an opportunity was identified to future-proof the building by incorporating deeper foundations and extra structural strengthening, in order that a second storey could be added in the future (in the hope that more resources might became available). In collaboration with Fondation Eagle, it was agreed amongst all concerned that this was sensible proposition, given that patient numbers had been rising year on year, and there is a young and growing population in the surrounding area. The hospital also occupies a small footprint of land, so upward expansion was agreed as a viable option looking to the future needs of people in the area.

Project timeline

- December 2021 Funding approved by Fondation Eagle for a new hospital building to ease overcrowding and improve health services for the local population
- March 2022 The building design is amended to incorporate deeper foundations and structural strengthening, in order that a second storey can be added in the future. The proposal included changing from a pitch roof to a flat roof and the Provincial Health Authority with the support of local well-wishers, committed GBP 9,126 from their funds to cover the shortfall
- > April 2022 Construction starts



October 2022 Severe flooding in the area delays building work



December 2022 The building is 80% completed. The Provincial Government step in with a further contribution of GBP 8,609 in order that a pitched roof can be installed after all. This was to provide better protection for the empty second floor of the structure, until such time as the resources become available to complete it. IMPACT Cambodia conducted regular site visits and inspections during the construction phase



May 2023 Building work is complete. A traditional Buddhist inauguration ceremony takes place on 26th May 2023 to bless the building and all who will use it



> June 2023 The ground floor of the hospital opens to patients

<u>Results</u>

Through the successful completion of this construction project, IMPACT Cambodia has achieved the goal of creating a new 15 bed in-patient ward at O'Chrov, which will go a long way towards combatting the issues of over-crowding at the hospital. As you may see from the photographs, the new facility is light-filled, spacious and modern, which is greatly enhancing infection control and ensuring patients are accommodated in much more comfort than they were in the older buildings.

The addition of a new delivery suite and post-natal recovery room has been a real positive for the hospital - within the first two days of opening, four mothers had safely delivered their babies!

Although Cambodia's Maternal Mortality Ratio (MMR) has improved from 606 per 100,000 births in 2000, to 218 in 2020, it is still higher than the regional average. And it is well-documented that enhancing the quality and accessibility of women's health services is key to improving maternal health outcomes and reducing maternal mortality. The newly housed Maternity Unit takes referrals from the seven health centres under its umbrella, and is helping to ensure that access to safe and skilled delivery assistance (as well as emergency obstetric care) is available to everyone, whatever their income. Alongside the new delivery suite is a postnatal ward for women to recover after birth, ensuring that any post-birth complications are identified and managed quickly. Support for women during the postpartum period also contributes to overall maternal well-being.

The Maternity Unit has had a busy first six months, with an average of 40 babies born per month. As word spreads about the services on offer and the new improved facilities, IMPACT Cambodia expect that patient numbers will increase and we very much look forward to keeping you updated.







Reth Sinuon (19) is one of the first four mothers who had a safe delivery in the new building. She lives in Kaub Lech, Kaub Commune, O Chrov District, Banteay Meanchey Province. This is her first child. *"I came to have prenatal visit since my first month of pregnancy. The staff here are very friendly and they take good care of me. I feel safe and comfortable to receive health care service here. The birth went well and I am very happy to have been given so much support during and after the delivery."*



"As a midwife who has been working here for more than five years, now, I am very happy that the hospital received this new building. Previously, the former maternity unit was very small. The predelivery and post-delivery was in the same room, and that room was very small. We, the midwives, did not even have a proper place to stay during our duty hour. This new building will provide us a proper place to stay and the mothers will have a proper place to stay before and after giving birth. We always want to provide maternity care service for everyone as best as we can possibly do." Midwife Kheng Srey Mom (pictured right)

The new building has also incorporated a dedicated treatment space and waiting area for Accident and Emergency patients and their families. IMPACT Cambodia is particularly pleased that A&E services have been elevated at the hospital, as there is a great need in this low-income setting. Accidents due to cooking on open fires are common, as are occupational accidents due low health and safety standards. Road traffic accidents are also a major concern. Local statistics are hard to come by but across Cambodia as a whole, 5.4 people die every day as a result, making it the sixth leading cause of mortality, greater than all deaths from HIV/AIDS. The A&E department is equipped to deliver life-saving interventions and immediate



medical treatments - crucial in emergency situations when time is of the essence.

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Budget notes:

The initial project budget of GBP 38,036 that was agreed with Fondation Eagle in December 2021 was superseded in March 2022, to incorporate the elements of the new building design, which added GBP 9,126 to the budget and was pledged by the Provincial Health Authority. 'Version 2' of the budget totalled GBP 47,619, including a recalculated 5% project management fee of GBP 2,268.

In February 2023, towards the end of the construction, the Health Authority stepped in with another funding injection of GBP 8,609, in order to complete the building with a pitched, rather than flat, roof. The management fee was not increased at this point, as the project was very near to completion and it was not necessary.

The final project expenditure came to GBP 56,228, representing an overspend of GBP 18,192. GBP 17,735 of which was been contributed by the Provincial Health Authority GBP 457 (to cover project management costs) from IMPACT UK's general funds.
