



Interim report to Fondation Eagle – 30th May 2023

Digital Learning Centre for Bishop Wambari Girl's Secondary School, Naivasha, Kenya

Introduction

On 14th December 2022, Fondation Eagle accepted our project proposal and awarded Footsteps International a grant of GBP 4,924. The aim of the project was to provide the Bishop Wambari Girl's Secondary school with a modern Digital Learning Centre which would provide the students with access to IT resources that form an increasingly important part of today's school curriculum in Kenya.

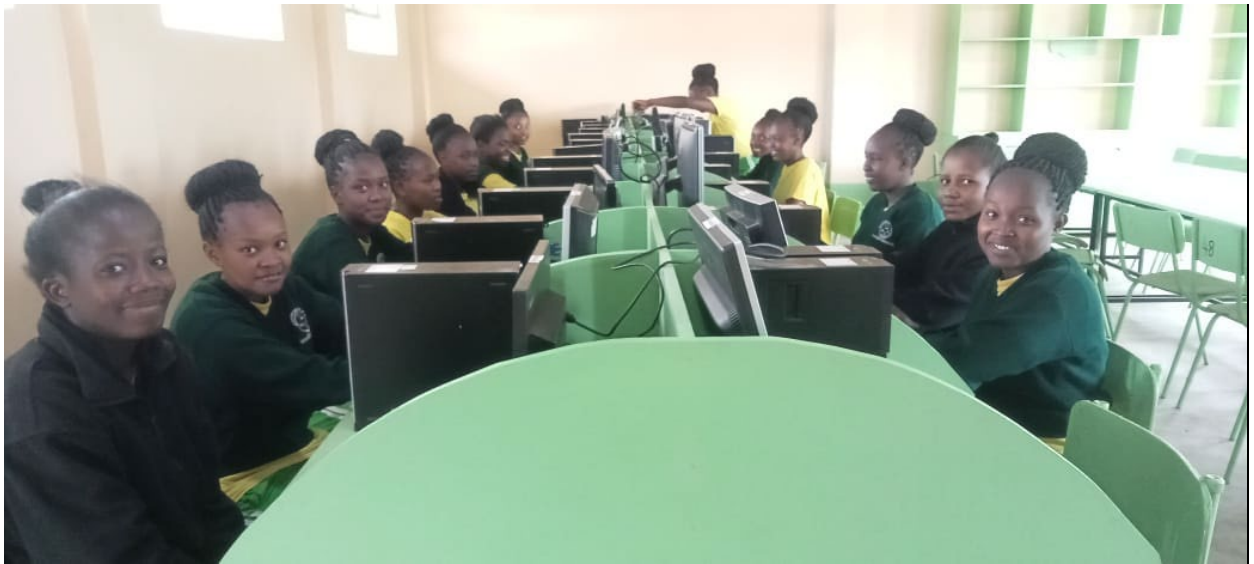
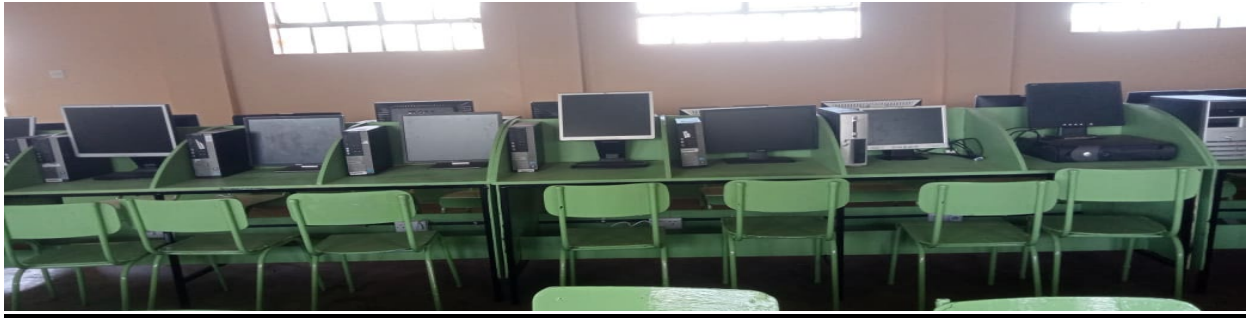
The project involved converting a classroom by installing desks, chairs and IT equipment. The **project beneficiaries** are the 130 students at the school, many of whom come from poor families.

We **received the grant** on 23rd December and **transferred funds** to Kenya on 27th December 2022, enabling the management team to start the project when the school re-opened after the Christmas holiday.

Project achievements

During the first weeks of the new term, we constructed desks and installed 50 chairs, computers and the associated wiring and router needed to complete the network and connect the computers to the internet. The new facility was ready for use by the students 11th May 2023.

Expenditure summary

Our estimated cost for the project was 684,400 Kenya Shillings (KES) at an exchange rate of GBP 1 = KES 139. We received the grant on 23rd December and transferred funds to Kenya on 27th December 2022, obtaining an actual exchange rate of GBP 1= 147.4 KES.

Our project team delivered the project with an **underspend of GBP 294** against the budget; this was achieved through tight budget control and a favourable exchange rate when we transferred the funds to Kenya.

The table below provides a detailed breakdown of the budgeted and actual expenditure (overspends are shown as negative figures).

Summary of project benefits

Successes:

We highlight some of the successes and direct benefits that we are deriving from the new digital learning centre:

- We can now meet the requirements of Kenya's Competency Based Curriculum (C.B.C system) which requires ICT to be integrated into many subjects.
- The students will now be able to get extra ICT-based learning and teaching, and are able to access revision materials online.
- Our students are now being equipped with skills necessary to succeed in a constantly changing technological, social and economic environment.

- It is providing a wide range of research for both teachers and students helping our students to become critical thinkers and information gatherers.
- The girls are becoming more engaged in their work because the technology they can now access provides opportunities to make learning more fun and enjoyable by teaching the same things in different ways.
- It is opening up avenues for communication between the students whereby they can talk and discuss what they are doing for their work.

Challenges:

- The School has access to experienced carpenters and IT specialists from NTTI which is on the adjacent plot. The project was delivered quickly and efficiently by this experienced team, and there were no significant challenges to implementation.

Conclusion

This vital project was completed on time and in full, and below budget cost in GBP due to the advantageous exchange rate and tight budget control by the implementation team.

The digital library enables the school to meet the needs of Kenya’s new CBC education system and provides the students with access to study materials and wider general knowledge, equipping them for life in modernizing Kenya, and will provide excellent service for many years to come.

The project has also made Bishop Wambari Girl’s School a more attractive place for parents to educate their daughters. Thank you Fondation Eagle for standing with us again.
