Project Overview

Fish for Tomorrow is a community based fisheries protection system in northern Malawi supported by RIPPLE Africa. The project is being run in Nkhata Bay and Nkhotakota Districts by Ripple Africa by local communities in partnership with RIPPLE Africa and the Department of Fisheries.



This funding has enabled us to introduce the project in an accelerated way in Chia Lagoon. This is the biggest lagoon in Nkhotakota District, acting as a key breeding area and refuge for many different fish species, including Chambo. Here we are working closely with fishing communities at 17 beach landing sites to introduce the new bylaws and fast track the project to halt the decline in fish stocks to safeguard livelihoods and food security.

Project Beneficiaries

There are now 14 Fish Conservation committees in operation covering 17 beach landing sites around the lagoon. Beneficiaries are as follows:

- 140 fish conservation committee members who are now empowered to play an active role in the project and the training that they are receiving is building their capacity to be more active in other community activities.
- 191 gear owners (fishers who own boats) who are now benefitting from increased catches, with the resultant increase in their household income.
- An additional 670 family members of gear owners are also benefitting based on an average rural household size of 4.5 (from Malawi Demographic and Health Survey 2015-2016)
- There are also other community members who service the fishing industry in this area who are benefitting fish sellers, shop owners, boat builders etc. Applying national averages to this area, that would mean approximately 1,000 people around Chia Lagoon

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- who service fishers will benefit, with the additional benefit to their families also.
- Nkhotakota's District Fisheries Officer and his team are being supported by RIPPLE Africa to build their capacity, enabling them to perform their duties more effectively.
- 100,000 people living in the southern part of Nkhotakota District obtain their fish from
 markets serviced from Chia Lagoon and will therefore benefit from increased supplies of
 larger Chambo. Eventually, once the project has become better established in Nkhotakota
 District, all 404,000 people living in Nkhotakota District will have increased availability of
 animal protein from fish.

Progress over the last 6 months

1. Meetings

Meetings held around the lagoon in the last six months have been mainly focusing on:

- Teaching community members about the importance of conserving fish
- Stressing the importance of observing the closed season to protect breeding fish
- The effects of using mosquito nets and other illegal gears for fishing on fish stocks

2. Umbrella committee activities

- Umbrella committees have met regularly and this has enabled FCC Chairs to share best practice as they sit on the Umbrella Committee.
- Their attendance at Area Development Committee (ADC) meetings is ensuring that fish conservation is highlighted in all planning activities around the lagoon.

3. Activities of The Fish Conservation Committees

 All 14 FCCs around the lagoon are now actively working to ensure that the bylaws are enforced and to penalise offenders.

- Theyare currently in the process of being evaluated using our FCC Perfomance system so that we can identify any areas where retraining or further support is needed.
- Net Confiscations The number of confiscated illegal fishing gears is now declining and this is an indication of the success of the project.

Successes and Challenges

Successes

 In total during the project period the 14 FCCs around Chia Lagoon have confiscated over 140 illegal fishing gears – small mosquito nets being used in shallow waters, large dragnets made of hundreds of individual mosquito nets sewn together, monofiliment gill nets and fish traps. The number of confiscations is now declining as more people are using legal fishing gear.

- On 21st December 2018, Ripple Africa and Fisheries organized patrols at Nkhotakota free market. With the help of market committee members, they managed to confiscate 41 kilograms of young Chambo, illegally caught. The fish were donated to Nkhotakota prison and the local hospital.
- Strong relationships have been built between the FCCs and their local community members and also with the District Fisheries team, who were previously seen only as an

- enforcement agency. There is now a genuine sense of partnership working between the FCCs and Fisheries and also with the police and judiciary who support the confiscation of illegal fishing gears and fining of offenders.
- The success of the project relies on people buying into it and taking ownership of the problems and their solutions. Afiki Nkhoma and Sitolo Mwalala were born and raised near Chia Lagoon and have fished the Lagoon for decades using mainly mosquito nets. However, since learning about the project from FCC members in their area (Ntchanmira and Chimpini), they have stopped using mosquito nets completely and have reported that they are now catching bigger fish using hooks which they are being able to sell at a higher price. They are now working hand in hand with FCC members teaching others in their community how best to conserve fish in Chia Lagoon.

Challenges

- We are yet to introduce the catch and income monitoring systems into the lagoon.
 However, we are told that catches are increasing and that fishers are seeing their incomes increase.
- FCCs are still seeing fishers in the lagoon who are using illegal gears but their policy of confiscation and finings has reduced the number considerably over the two year period.

Budget

The funding from Fondation Eagle was towards the total cost of running the accelerated project in Chia Lagoon. We were able to secure funding from another donor which enabled us to carry out all our planned activities and the total project expenditure has been as follows and is in line with our budget for our work in Chia Lagoon, one of the 5 Fisheries strata in Nkhotakota District:
