## Notes to the tables:

- 1) Please note that most of the projects are funds for construction and purchase of equipment, and thus the beneficiaries will be on-going for several years. I have only included the beneficiaries for 1 year in the table. On average we count 7-10 years for construction in under-developed counties and 5-7 for equipment. So with the grants of 2018, at the lowest point of the spectrum, 5 years' beneficiaries, the Foundation's aid will benefit around 2,707,590 people in need, well under 1 CHF per person.
- 2) Food production and water projects have very high numbers of beneficiaries as the whole population of the region benefits whereas school construction, for example, is pricey and only benefits a certain number of children per year.
- 3) Health centers also have high numbers of beneficiaries as they include the whole population of the area.
- 4) Most charities defend vociferously that the benefit of a school constructed ought to include the whole population, the families etc as they all benefit. It is true that the whole society benefits, although I preferred to include only the numbers of students attending in 1 year, which in many cases will increase due to the new buildings.
