<b>Emergency Relief due to Covid-19</b>			
Support for three Condor families without income	600	15	Three of the Condor students live in Catzuqui de Velasco, a small and remote village in the mountains at the edge of Quito. All of the parents lost their jobs when quarantine was imposed, and food became difficult to obtain in the village. This expenditure paid for someone to buy food and other necessities for them in Quito and to drive with these supplies to the village. This was done twice, once in April and once in May.
Support for one Condor family which contracted the virus	300	5	In the middle of May, one of the students who the Condor Trust supports and his family (two parents and two siblings) caught corona virus. The family had no financial reserves at all, and no employment. The situation was made more difficult as one of the children is severely physically disabled. The money, added to donations from other sources, has paid for food, medicine and cleaning products. By the beginning of June, all three children had recovered, and the mother was beginning to feel better. The father remains ill but is, we think, improving.
<b>Unemployment support</b>			
Support for one Condor mother for one month	230	4	In February, the mother of one of the Condor students lost her job as a cleaner and was unable to find another job immediately. We supported her and her family for a month.
<b>Educational expenses</b>			
Help with educational expenses for one of our students	200	1	In December 2019, one of our students was awarded a Young Leaders Scholarship by the US Embassy in Ecuador. This gave him the chance to go with a group of students to spend a month in Ohio in February 2020. Although all travel and accommodation expenses were paid by the US Embassy, other necessary expenditure (vaccinations, winter clothing, passport, visa etc) was not. This money, together with money raised by the family, contributed to these expenses.
