Responding to the Covid 19 pandemic means we have had to adapt our programme delivery model to reach beneficiaries who for large parts of the year were prohibited from travelling, and to enable us to continue to meet the needs of the communities we serve. Previously, we delivered at least half of the farmer training to community smallholder farmers at Haller's Farmer Training Centre in Mtopanga and approx.70% of our health service was delivered at our health clinic facilities at Nguuni.

Continuing curfews and restrictions on mobility in the district, strict limitations on the number of passengers Matatu's can transport (8 people instead of 20) and the heavy police presence enforcing rules, meant that in order to provide our emergency support programme, we had to transport the whole range of Haller services and interventions out to each community. The continuing lockdowns and curfews throughout the three waves to date has meant our model has developed naturally into an integrated health, farming and education outreach programme, to ensure the most effective community support possible. We have reorganised our traditional delivery model, to one where a combined Haller team covering all aspects of health, farming, food, water security and education is now delivered as an integrated outreach session in each community. This evolved programme continues as best practice and will do so for the foreseeable future.

This development has meant that our off-road vehicles have become even more crucial to our work as two vehicles are required for every trip. Each community outreach visit incorporates at least 6 key Haller staff to cover farmer training, dispersal of seeds and agricultural supplies, Covid 19 prevention training, family planning and HIV prevention services, vaccinations and a general primary health service. It also includes the Haller librarian, who travels with her book loaning box, so that children can access reading material. Reading and activity sessions are held with the community children while their mothers are having training or treatment.

To facilitate this change, our vehicles were the lifeline of our new approach. All three outreach vehicles were in need of a complete overhaul if we were to ensure effective ongoing outreach provision. The age, mileage, weather and tough offroad driving conditions in the region to reach rural communities, really takes its toll on the SUV's we use. A thorough overhaul meant the longevity of the vehicles would be assured for a few more years, so that we can continue to operate effectively, particularly in the more remote areas. With sustainability at our charity's core – repair rather than replacement, wherever possible, is in line with our ethos.

Project Report

Two of the three vehicles requiring repair have previously been funded by grants from Fondation Eagle. GoodTimer Services on the Mombasa Malindi Highway, is the repair shop designated for the extensive overhaul work. Due to the impact of Covid 19 however, fewer skilled mechanics have been employed, so works have taken longer than anticipated. However, our directors and trustees are pleased with the quality and reliability of work to date and current status is noted below. Project Outcomes

Outreach services to Nguu Tatu, Voroni and Kimbunga have taken place in the past two weeks, with the overhauled vehicle also being vital in collecting key supplies and equipment prior to the visits themselves. Supplies of seeds and ready to use therapeutic food for malnourished children have been collected as the focus remains on food production and checking for malnutrition in community children after three waves of the Covid 19 virus. There has been evidence of mild to moderate malnutrition in a small number of children at each location, with the diagnosis done according to the WHO paediatric protocol where a child's height, weight and mid upper arm circumference are measured.

A two week course of RUTC has then administered.



Voroni is a location with two relatively new communities in close proximity, who are both only 9 months into The Haller Journey, our community development

model.



Consequently, there has been more of a focus upon food production here as they are only just starting to learn basic farming techniques. Their WASH infrastructure has been completed but the rain-fed dams remain dry as the rains are very late. They are being supported and advised to plants seeds and use well water for irrigation purposes to ensure sufficient ongoing food supply. Again, the repaired vehicle has been crucial in allowing access to such vulnerable new communities.

Conclusion

Thank you so much for your support of this vital capital cost project essential to our work delivering services to rural Kenyan communities. This has proved particularly vital during the pandemic as our key staff and equipment have had to be transported out to the communities themselves. Currently, lockdowns and curfews have been eased after the third (most serious) wave, so Haller's Farmer Training Centre can again be accessed by our community smallholders. The vehicle has been used for transporting community farming mentors to the Centre for vital updates on their farming knowledge, to improve livelihoods, as well as for delivering outreach services. Sadly, given the current situation with vaccine poverty and low levels of available vaccines in Kenya, it is highly likely that further lockdowns and restrictions will ensue and the communities are reliant purely upon outreach services once more.

We look forward to updating you in the next 6 months as the project is completed, but more significantly on the impact that the rebuild of the vehicles will have on our community outreach programme.
