Details of the Project:

The existing but collapsing Junior High School had all years (1-3) functioning, total population of 126 students and 8 teachers. However, parents were increasingly concerned for the safety of their children so attendance had fallen badly recently.

The school urgently needed a new 3 classroom unit block with and office and store and 5 seater toilet block and urinal.

The old school was built with local material which, over the years, could no longer withstand the harsh weather and had serious cracks and part fallen walls and roofing. There were no toilets. Toilets (until fairly recently not seen in schools) are increasingly recognised as an essential element in encouraging girls to attend school throughout the month. Menstruation is considered as 'dirty' in many of these societies so girls need the privacy of toilets to enable them to attend school every day.

The school was dangerously housing very determined boys and girls. The structure of weak land- blocks was so unstable that the community were sure the next heavy rain storm would I pull the whole thing down. The building could not be repaired. Without a new structure, children leaving primary school would have been unable to progress to this next stage and completely lose any hope for escape from the endemic poverty of their families.

Construction:

Most of the work was completed during the end of the dry season. This made work easier although did mean that there was extra expense for water. For this school, the whole process ran very smoothly.

The community were very appreciative and supportive in preparing the land, accommodating workers and providing meals for them during the construction. The Chief and his elders gave us a safe store for materials and helped daily in carting materials from the store to the site.

The local M.P. provided money for food for the workers and drinking water.

Challenges:

The land was hard to work on, especially the toilets, but they were able to cut through the rocks. Another serious difficulty was water supply for the work as the source was at Yapei which is quite a distance away, and so the tanker driver insisted on a higher price than budgeted. We had to agree as fuel prices had increased alarmingly in recent times, in some cases every week. The major, rapid, inflation during the time of construction could have had serious effects on the work. Workers were insisting on increases in their charges. We pleaded with them to maintain their charges for the time being as we were unable to make adjustments at this time. The negotiations went well and they agreed to maintain the charges. We did make a small increase in the payment to the masons.

The support of the community and their desire to see the school come to fruition as they committed in all ways possible to see to its success is very commendable.

Impact:

Zanzugu Yipala has replaced its dangerous Junior High School, where children were packed into collapsing rooms. There is a completely safe new building with sufficient space for all. The roof is secure and it now has doors that can be locked, making the building far more secure. There is also a room for teachers to use and for materials to be stored. Previously the head's room was a corner of a classroom. The first ever toilets here will take a while for pupils to learn to use properly but our experience shows that they will vastly improve conditions, putting an end to the normal journeys to fields or bushes for defaecation and urination. Girls will attend school throughout the month, not having to stay at home during menstruation.

The teachers have improved confidence and more determination. The new building is making their work much less hazardous. They are delighted as you can see from picture above.

Project beneficiaries:

Immediately the 126 students have been joined by more whose parents had used the reason of unsafe building not to allow them to continue schooling post primary.

The result of this will be that more students will enter Senior High and achieve the results they need to obtain formal qualifications and enter work or further education So hundreds of families will be freed from poverty, long-term.

For the 8 teachers, life is greatly improved. They have a place to work quietly, plan lessons, store books and materials. They no longer have to worry about chunks of ceiling falling or the dangers of deeply eroded flooring.

Zanzugu Junior High has children enrolling now from 12 surrounding villages.

The work at Zanzugu school shows an apparent underspend of £227. Toilet underspend = £428. In reality it has been difficult for the team in Ghana to separate out the spending on this and Vogu school. Vogu had an overspend.



The community have planted many trees to shield the school from difficult weather.

Result and Conclusion:

At long last parents of Junior High children can confidently send them to school in Zanzugu. Children and teachers are proud of their classrooms and the fact that the outside world has noticed their plight has greatly lifted morale and determination. Ghana Education Service recognises its responsibility to ensure that high quality teachers are in place and will recruit more if the need arises.
