CONTEXT

This project to construct a new school building for Maromby Primary School targets a primary school already benefiting from FBM's school feeding programme, in collaboration with Mary's Meals. Their school building was destroyed by Cyclones Batsirai and Emnati in February 2022, meaning the church had to be borrowed for teaching. The project aims to increase access to education for children, to improve education standards and therefore exam results by ensuring a satisfactory schooling environment. This will help contribute to the long-term development of the area and poverty reduction. This report presents progress up to mid-April 2023.

Expected results: A total of three new furnished classrooms built, together with latrines/urinal/shower, rainwater catchment system and hand-washing unit.



Challenges:

• Poor road conditions; Maromby is located in a highly remote area and the state of the road is particularly bad between Ifanadiana and Ambohimisafy. For this reason, deliveries were not possible in the midst of the rainy season and had to be planned for before and after the worst of the rains.

- Poor weather conditions, particularly during the rainy season from December 2022 to March 2023, including two cyclones that hit Madagascar (Cheneso and Freddy). This led to delays in the community's transport of materials from Ambohimisafy to the site, and to their transport of sand. In light of damage caused by cyclones in 2022, it was decided best to be cautious and the start of the main building work was therefore pushed back until the drier period. This also gave more time to communities to get their contributions together, particularly in light of the high level of poverty since the 2022 cyclones that impacted food security and living standards significantly.
- Poverty levels and time constraints of the local population who were also preoccupied rebuilding the school kitchen and toilets that got destroyed in the latest 2023 cyclones. This led to delays in community contributions to the project, including collecting the sand and its delivery to the building site, particularly since it involves a 1 km walk from the river to Maromby. Organisation of beneficiaries to transport the materials from the central storeroom in Ambohimisafy to Maromby is also challenging due to the distance and mountainous terrain.

- Delays to the start of work were also due to a theft from the school's canteen storeroom, that led to the canteen's suspension on the 6th February 2023 until the food was replaced (as per the school feeding rules) and until more security measures were put in place. Out of prudence, the further deliveries of materials and the start of building work was also suspended until the canteen restarted on the 5th April 2023.
- The mould for aeration bricks broke and so an order was placed for a new one, meaning that the 60 aeration bricks required have not yet been completed.
- Space constraints on the school's land made it difficult to find sufficient land for the new school building, and extra levelling of the land was required.

Changes:

In addition to the change in project timing, due to the topography of the site and the need for additional levelling of the land, construction of a support wall is also required to protect the new building and school land. This will measure 40 metres and be 2.5 metres high. This will lead to a longer building time.

Conclusion

The launch of the actual building work was later than originally planned due to the timing of this project and to avoid problems during the rainy season, and in light of the numerous other challenges as detailed above. As a result, the building of the support wall will start on the 22nd April (after the arrival of the builders' tools), in parallel with the start of building the school itself. Completion of the building work is expected on the 14th July 2023. The materials remaining to be delivered are cement, metal roofing sheeting, paint, lattice, furniture, wheelbarrows, various tools and rebars. Close monitoring and support will be provided to make sure that the project keeps on track, particularly encouragement of the local population to carry the materials from Ambohimisafy.
